Nelson \$chool explains ***

Carol Dweck is the originator of the research behind mindset. She determines that there is a fixed mindset and a growth mindset. Fixed mindset can mean that a person settles on making a mistake and not overcoming it or feeling that they can't do any better whereas growth mindset determines that mistakes help us improve and, with effort and overlearning, improvement can be made.

Here is a simple grid to help us see the way ideas can be phrased to promote a growth mindset:

Instead of	Try saying
I can't do it.	I'm still learning. I'll keep trying.
I'm not good at this.	What can I learn to get better at this?
I'm afraid of making a mistake.	Mistakes are how I learn and get better.
This is too hard.	With more practice, it'll get easier.
l give up.	I'll try a different way.
I don't know how.	I can learn how.
They are better at it than I am.	What can I learn from them?

The word 'yet' is also powerful. When a child says they can't do something, we say you can't do it 'yet'. This encourages them to believe that with time, practise and effort, difficulties can be overcome.

Children often communicate their needs through their behaviours.
